Budget Summary Fiscal Year 2025

Summary

Priorities in the next fiscal year will include efforts on educating individuals, especially youth, on the dangers of tobacco and vaping, opioid misuse, and other unsafe behaviors. Environmental health services continue to protect the environment and water quality in our region for generations to come. An additional priority is to protect individuals from communicable diseases through education, vaccination, and clinical services.

Investing in public health can lead to significant benefits, including reduced healthcare costs, improved quality of life, and accomplishing our vision of Healthy People in Healthy Communities. We look forward to working with community partners, local policy-makers, and the EIPH Board of Health to develop and adapt significant public health solutions for the future of our community's individuals and families.



Operating, Salary, and Benefit Costs

Operating

Budgeted operating expenses have increased 7.2% from fiscal year 2024. Operating is beginning to stabilize from the 26% increase in 2024, however inflation continues to increase costs this upcoming year. Vaccine costs from both existing vaccines as well as new-to-market vaccines (Shingles, COVID, and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)) led to substantial growth in Immunization program operating budget. As a smaller portion of the increase, higher costs of fuel, supplies, and building maintenance all are contributors.

Salaries

Economic growth in Idaho and an increased cost of living are placing pressure on staff retention. This year's budget includes an across-the-board 3% raise for employees. The hardworking staff at EIPH continue to provide dedicated, timely, and critical public health services while keeping costs low.

Employee Benefits

EIPH employer health insurance costs are decreasing \$750 per beneficiary in fiscal year 2025. With 77 EIPH staff that receive health benefits, this equates to an approximate \$57,750 in decreased costs. We anticipate that this reduction will be temporary with a return to previous costs for FY 2026.

Fees and Interest


Figure 2: Revenue Distributions FY2019-2025

For fiscal year 2025, EIPH is budgeting a 20.0% increase in fee revenue. We anticipate the construction activity to remain constant from FY 2024 after reduction from FY 2021 peaks. This is expected to result in stable septic permit fee revenue. EIPH will experience increased receipts, related to costs captured from increased vaccine prices, resulting in increased revenue in the Immunization Program.

Subgrants

This year's budget reflects a decrease of 16.2% in subgrant funding compared to fiscal year 2024. This is largely attributable to significant reductions in COVID Epidemiology and Vaccine related subgrants. On a positive note, the Idaho Millennium Fund, through the Idaho Legislature, has continued funding prevention efforts to curb youth vaping and smoking. Otherwise, minor fluctuations are expected in subgrant funding.





EIPH Budget Distributions FY2019-2025: Local taxpayer contributions have remained near constant, while contracts and fees have increased over time to provide increased public health programing.


County Appropriations

EIPH is judicial in our expenditures, which has resulted in not requesting an increase for the previous 6 fiscal years. However, with inflation causing increased costs at all levels, as well as prudent financial planning for the future, EIPH is requesting an increase of 3% in county appropriations for fiscal year 2025.
